f.	Background on the project, this was done to prolong the service life of the runway.		
g.	Explained enhancements made (e.g.: more lights), enhanced safety measures.	Shibani Subedi, Calgary Airports	
h.	Explained how the project was sustainable (reusing materials)		
i.	The project is now in Phase 8, which will run until November 2025. Most of the work left is asphalt pavement, landscaping, tidying.		
j.	Ongoing activities: electrical works, asphalt pavement, line painting, testing and commissioning (mostly done for electrical).		
k.	Envision Certification Process – we are aiming to be the first airport in Canada to receive this certification for the sustainable achievements during this project.		
l.	Next steps: Phase 9 (November to December). This is testing and commissioning. December 2 nd is the target date for the runway opening.		



- m. Questions: Is the closure why patterns have changed the past 2 weeks?
 - Not major shifts, but the winds probably impacted this. Once the West Runway opens operations should go back to what they were.
- n. Question: How often are Envision awards revealed? Do they have a website? Is it public information. This criteria is very interesting.
 - i. Applications can be submitted at any time

 - ii. Yes, there is a public website. It shows that YYC will be the first Canadian airport to receive this certification. YUL is also applying for it. We submitted the application to them; we recycled 80% of the runway (which is not easy). We are taking very good sustainable actions. Once Envision gets back to us, approve us, we will be on the website.

 - Temporary building for construction, shelter for workers. Once construction is over, we will remove the building.

- connectivity and economic events, emphasizing the prevalence of sex trafficking and the airport's vulnerability as a transit point.
- c. Soft Room Implementation: A specialized 'soft room' was established at YYC to provide a safe, dignified space for victims, equipped with essentials like clothing, food, toiletries, and communication tools, and designed with input from a multidisciplinary team.
- d. **Partnerships and Training:** YYC collaborates with Not in My City, RCMP, Calgary Police, and other organizations, and has trained airport workers to recognize and report signs of trafficking, with awareness materials placed in all airport washrooms (a yellow rose by NIMC).
- e. Success Stories and Expansion: shared examples of successful interventions, including direct victim support and coordination with airlines for safe transport, and noted that the YYC model is being adopted by other major Canadian airports.
- f. Community Engagement and Resources: encouraged attendees to take the free Not in My City online training and to remain vigilant for signs of trafficking, highlighting the importance of community awareness and reporting.
- g. Organized criminal activity. Global phenomenon, but Calgary is a hub because we have many international flights.
